n recent years, Pune has witnessed significant monsoon-related flooding incidents that have caused inconvenience to citizens and disrupted normal life. Some of the common consequences of

turned into a season of fear and hardships in the city. The improper management of construction activities and the encroachment on riverbeds and natural nullahs have exacerbated the situation, leaving the citizens to face the consequences of the authorities' inade-

Due to the construction of cement roads, there is a lack of seepage of the groundwater, which is one of the major







Building the Sudan Block

ehind the iconic structure of the Sudan Block, the administrative building of the National Defence Academy (NDA), which is celebrating 75 glorious years of existence, is the compelling story of planning the structure from the ground

up. From surveying and acquiring land for the purpose to addressing the grievances of landowners and then planning the design, the account needs to be told and retold, much like ancient legends.

The story begins with my father, VS Gupchup, who began his associa tion with the

National War Academy Project on August 2, 1948. It marked his initial encounter with chief engineer WX Mascarenhas, who provided a briefing on his assignment

The office, a small unit, consisted of the chief engineer, senior superintendent SS Pandit, a senior architect, an executive engineer, and two assistant engineers including him.

Their primary responsibility was to survey and acquire the designated land. To aid in this task, the state government assigned a special land acquisition officer to collaborate with them. The endeavour was far from easy but was accomplished with the guidance of veteran officers.

It involved attentively listening to and addressing the grievances of landowners and dealing with situations where crops still occupied the surveyed plots. These lands were acquired only after the crops were harvested.

Occasionally, enraged landowners, armed with sticks and pickaxes, would charge at them. However, the accompanying land acquisition officer would somehow manage to pacify them, saying, "The land is required in the interest of our nation. If not us, future genera-

tions will benefit from it. You should cooperate in this great undertaking. Rest assured, you will be duly compensat-

Meanwhile, the architect commenced drafting plans for the project. King, a partner at the renowned Mumbai-based firm Messrs Gregson, Batley, and King, served as the consulting architect. He would visit the site every Sunday and create essential maps. The project's various requirements were being considered, and work proAjit Vishnu Gupchup graduated from the National Defence Academy (NDA) and retired as a Commander of the Indian Navy. He proudly recounts the story of how his father, the late VS Gupchup, and uncle, the late NS Gupchup, were an integral part of the team that constructed the iconic Sudan Block, the administrative building of NDA

gressed at a rapid pace. The state government had provided the land, and the goal was to complete the project within six to seven years.

The first and foremost necessity was to construct roads that would provide access to the construction sites. Initially, there was a proposal to utilise the existing road that linked the sites to nearby villages, passing through Kothrud and Hingane. However, it was later decided to construct a gravel road from Pashan, and this proposal was accepted. The new road was completed within a year.

Simultaneously, the locations for key buildings were finalised, and plans were made accordingly. The location of the administrative building was determined first, followed by decisions on the placements of other structures.

On October 6, 1949, the foundation of the administrative building was laid in a simple ceremony by then-Prime Minister Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru. Soon, work commenced at a frenzied pace

Towards the end of 1949, my uncle NS Gupchup, who was the chief engineer of the Hindustan Construction Company and a renowned expert in RCC technology, joined as a special engineer in the planning department.

He was put in charge of three specific tasks: the Sudan Block, Cadet Campus A and B, and the main road, known as NDA road. Under his guidance, the dome of the administrative building was constructed using RCC technology, which posed considerable risks even for the labourers. However, by taking extensive precautions, they successfully accomplished the task.

The overall construction of the building took two years. Subsequently, the work on constructing the two domes began. Skeletons for the domes were created, and concrete was poured continuously for 40 hours without a break. The team worked tirelessly round the clock. Constructing the outer dome proved to be relatively easier as cut stones from

Jodhpur and Malad were used, giving the building an elegant appearance

Sundays used to be special for the team. My uncle insisted that all project workers reside on-site, fostering a family-like atmosphere. The day would begin with a few hours of tennis followed by a hearty breakfast. They would then visit Pune. The construction of the buildings was completed around 1954-1955, and their utilisation began shortly thereafter.

A photo album of the construction of the NDA administrative headquarters was among the treasured possessions of my father. Following his demise, we as a family decided that the best way to preserve his memory was to gift the album to the NDA where it could be preserved safely in the archives. So, a couple of years later, I went to the Academy and presented it to Lt Gen Jatinder Singh, who was the then Commandant.

A (W)HOLE LOT OF TROUBLE!

Manhole sinks below ground level on Prabhat Road; someone places flower pot on it; PMC swings into action after matter gets highlighted on social media

he lackadaisical attitude of the Pune Municipal Corporation (PMC) once again came to the fore when a flower pot was placed by someone over a damaged manhole on the recently-tarred stretch of Prabhat Road. The sewer hole, which had sunk below the ground level, could have proved dangerous for motorists. Apparently, the flower pot was placed by someone to avoid a mishap. However, its presence in the middle of the road was causing inconvenience to commuters.

Interestingly, the civic body jumped

into action only after the matter gained significant traction on social media. The flower pot has been removed and the portion of the road around the manhole has been tarred and covered.

Speaking to *Mirror*, Akshay Damle, a resident of Kamla Nehru Park, said that the PMC had carried out stormwater drainage work on the road between February and March.

"The civic body had planned to construct a concrete road but citizens opposed the idea. It was apprehended that the concrete surface would cause rainwater runoff and prevent it from soaking into the ground.

Following the intervention of MLA Sidharth Shirole, the PMC agreed on laying a tar road, which was completed in May's first week." he said.

He said, "The manhole was completely covered during the road tarring. The tar layer was removed by the contractor two weeks ago after residents raised the issue. However, the traffic load on the stretch caused the manhole to sink. The matter was raised on social media after someone placed a flower pot on it. Subsequently, Shirole also intervened on the issue fol-

lowing which the manhole was repaired by the PMC contractor. The cementing work has been completed."

Speaking to *Mirror*, Shirole said, "The PMC did not carry out the drainage work satisfactorily. I have reprimanded PMC officials as well as the contractor and warned them that such sub-standard quality of work will not be tolerated."

He added, "Some finishing work still remains. I have instructed the contractor and civic authorities to complete it as soon as possible."

'We are also interacting with public reps to curb crimes'

n a candid interview with Pune Times Mirror, Pimpri-Chinchwad police commissioner **Vinoy** Kumar Choubey speaks about various measures he has taken to curb street, cyber and white collar crimes in the twin towns, besides shedding light on various welfare schemes to ensure safety in the industrial belt and recruitment of highly skilled manpower in the force. Excerpts:

What about the staff who face challenges in the investigation of complicated cases where there is a requirement of highly techno savvy manpower?

We deal with a cosmopolitan public. Because of the presence of many multinationals in Pimpri, Chinchwad, Bhosari, Talegaon and MhalungeBeing an IT and auto hub, with major centres such as Rajiv Gandhi Infotech Park; Chakan, Talegaon Dabhade and Talegaon-Chakan-Mahlunge industrial belt, besides pilgrimage sites such as Alandi, the twin towns of Pimpri Chinchwad have been facing several challenges for police to maintain law and order

missioner, two deputy commissioners and four assistant commissioners. Some personnel will be coming to the city through the inter-district transfer policy.

The fast-developing twin towns are facing newer challenges of traffic congestion, like Pune city. How are you dealing with it?

Citizens' complaints about traffic problems are on the rise. However, we have a better road network than other cities. The width of internal roads connecting urban and rural areas is a problem. We are talking with the stakeholders to find a solution.

How do you enroll yourself in social media interaction, which is often avoided by your counterparts?

I took to Twitter for the first time to

What measures have been taken to enhance the surveillance system to curb crime?

The jurisdiction of the commissionerate is spread along with Pimpri-Chinchwad Municipal Corporation limits, municipal councils such as Talegaon, Chakan and Alandi. The planning authorities, like PMRDA and MIDC, are also a part of the commissionerate, but CCTV cameras are yet to be installed to cover the entire area. Except for municipal limits, we are expanding our network with the help of

Any measures to curb the increasing trend amongst the younger generation to consume drugs and narcotics?

We have written to the civic authorities to remove 250 illegal paan shops within 100 metres of schools and colleges to ensure that students and out-of-school children in the city do not get addicted to drugs. Our anti-narcotics cell is keeping an eye on such activities and ensuring preventive action against suspected drug peddlers.

What about the increase in street crimes?

We have started the work of closing all types of shops after 10.30 pm to prevent crimes, and it is yielding good results.

We are also constantly interacting with representatives of people and various social groups for the cause. As schools and colleges are now reopening, a meeting of their principals will be held and our women officers in plain clothes will patrol the areas during the school-college timings to ensure that the student community is safe.

Besides, special efforts are being made by the crime branch to crack down on organised crime. We are also holding meetings with doctors, lawyers, senior citizens, housing society federations and traders' organisations to

know their problems.

We are coordinating with trade unions, micro-small and medium enterprise associations and political leaders because of different problems being faced by the migrant population.

Please describe the recent success story of the Moshi-Chakan road, where you managed to provide a major relief to motorists from the chaotic traffic.

Our officials have taken some measures on the Moshi-Chakan road. We have reduced the travel time from 39 minutes to 24 minutes between 15-km stretches. The roads in Hinjawadi are narrow and the issue of a traffic jam is serious. We have planned rotary-style traffic on those roads and the traffic keeps moving. The civic body and Smart City authority, as well as Metro, are providing wardens to solve the traffic congestion issue.

What measures are being taken to ensure the safety of senior citizens. especially those who are living alone?

For every 30 elderly people in the city, one staff member will be appointed, who will stay in touch with these elderly people and help them in every way possible. In case of a medical emergency, all possible aid will be provided.



Not an easy task

The Pimpri Chinchwad township is currently home to many from across the country, as they settle here after education, employment and retirement. Considering special needs, a separate police commissionerate was created five years ago. But with political instability in the state in the last five years, the city witnessed four different police commissioners. None of them completed the prescribed tenure. Many had innovative ideas, but they could not execute them.
Since December, police commissioner
Vinoy Kumar Choubey has been working
hard to resolve long-pending issues and reform the system.

interact directly with citizens. This social networking site is being used extensively by citizens who have come to the city for education and are settled in the city after retirement or because their children are abroad. Our day-to-day functioning will not necessarily make it possible to meet every citizen in person. The idea of communicating on Twitter came up and it seemed to be getting a good response.

Software-hardware engineers were appointed to the cyber cell, those with commerce background to the Economic Offences Wing while selected candidates with qualifications in technical knowledge have been sent to Sangvi, Wakad, Hinjewadi and Chakan police stations. round 1.5 lakh students from across the state have anchored in Pune to prepare for the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC), Maharashtra Public Service Commission (MPSC) and other competitive exams, according to a

other competitive exams, according to a survey conducted by a students' organisation.

The candidates, many of whom are either from the weaker sections of society

either from the weaker sections of society or are children of farmers from small villages, face the dual challenge of cracking the tough exams and surviving in the city with limited cash at their disposal. Mirror delved into candidates' affairs

and found out that besides facing financial problems, some of those who failed to clear the exams in many attempts have stayed back in the city and chose to either run classes while a few started tea and snacks stalls or libraries.

Mahesh Bade, a UPSC aspirant and co-ordinator of MPSC Sangharsh Samiti, said his organisation conducted a survey at 18 locations in the city and its suburbs on UPSC and MPSC students' lifestyles and found that 1,50,000 are preparing for competitive exams.

"There are around 207 study centers,"

aspirant, said, "I hai preparing for competitive assurable known academy for I paid an annual fee to clear MPSC or UP Peth on a cot basis."

this industry is around Rs 2,500 crore ir Pune and its suburbs," he said.

Bade said that only 15 percent of the candidates clear the exams. "Failure in the exams after spending three to eight years, many aspirants did not return to their native places. While some have started working for coaching classes, others have opened tea stalls and snacks centers. Some of them have also started libraries and hostel services for newcomers."

Mirror found a number of candidates staying in the Peth areas and suburbs facing problems like admission to hostels, monthly mess, library and classes.

Sachin Patil, an MA student and an aspirant, said, "I hail from Beed and am preparing for competitive exams in 2019. After graduation, I joined a well-known academy for foundation courses. I paid an annual fee of Rs 50,000. I want to clear MPSC or UPSC. I stay in Sadashiv Peth on a cot basis. I spend at least Rs 15,000 per month on accommodation, mess, library and my daily expenses. My father and mother are farmers."



Prerana Sonawane, an MSc student, said that after the COVID-19 pandemic, she moved to Pune for MPSC preparation. "I drew inspiration from success stories that are uploaded on social media platforms. I stay in a girls' hostel by spending Rs 10,000 per month. We faced problems like not getting rooms on rent in residential buildings. The fees for the classes is about Rs 30,000 with books. It

is very difficult to manage the expenses in Pune. Hope I will be successful in the future "

Ganesh Joshi, owner of a hostel, said, "There are 1,200 boys and 1,000 girls living in our hostel in New Sadashiv Peth. We charge Rs 3,000 per person, per month for accommodation and Rs 2,500 for mess facilities."

Vikas Dubey said he owns five tea

stalls in Sadashiv Peth, Kelkar Road, Laxmi Road, Shastri Road and Navi Peth areas. "We sell at least around 10,000 glasses of tea in the Sadashiv Peth area daily. The turnover is around Rs 1,00,000 per day for each stall. We have 25 workers. We also sell snacks with tea."

Vadehi Fadake runs a mess in Sadashiv Peth. "We have lost business due to the pandemic. Previously, we served 300 boxes of meals per day, but only 150 plus now. Besides, small restaurants and snacks centres have hit our business badly. We serve food at a reasonable rate, that is Rs 2,500 for two meals and Rs 1,200 for one."

Vivek Giri said, "Before the pandemic, we had photocopying centres at many locations. When we received queries about a well-equipped library for study, we took a huge hall on rent and provided A-Cs, WiFi, clean water, toilets and restroom facilities

for girls. There are 3,000 members in our library. We charge each candidate Rs 1,200 per month."

Hemant Patil told Mirror that he had come to Pune for MPSC and UPSC preparation 15 years ago, but could not clear either exams, despite several attempts. "I, along with my roommates, started a coaching academy for students from rural areas at affordable fees. We charge only Rs 30,000 for coaching, mock exams, books, interview practicals and other activities. We have 5,000 students. Every aspirant should have Plan B, in case of failure to crack the exams; MPSC and UPSC are not the end of the world," he added

Ensuring Safety

ilk is an indispensable part of the majority of people's diets irrespective of their ages. Most of them, however, are unaware that the 'caretaker' of their bones' health is struggling with 'bad' health. Reason: Adulteration. So. next time when you buy your daily carton of milk, you better watch what you are buying. It is highly possible that your glass of milk is watered down and laced with liquid paraffin and whey powder.

Two such cases were reported in the city last year. Although, this is not the case with milk alone as other food and beverages – vegetable oil, paneer, skimmed milk powder - for instance, also find their names in the list of contaminated food items, cautions Arjun Bhujbal, joint commissioner, Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

In a tete-à-tete with Mirror, Bhujbal and Surender Shivsagar, assistant commissioner of FDA, elaborate on the issue and how the government agency tackles the problem.

Ûrging the people to be vigilant on what they consume, Bhujbal says, "If citizens have any doubt about the quality of food, packaged or bottled water and drugs, then they may complain to the FDA toll-free number - 1800 222 365. We are here to help you."

"We investigate citizens' complaints. Although there have been many instances of food adulteration, poisoning from tainted food has not occurred," says the joint commissioner.

So which food items are found adulter-

The FDA plays a crucial role in keeping citizens safe from consuming tainted food items and beverages by taking appropriate action against violators

ated most frequently? "We have been detecting adulteration in vegetable oil (vanaspati), paneer, milk, skimmed milk powder, jaggery, mango, frozen whole wheat, chapati, khawa, almond beverages, sweets and goodie shev, rava, nira, and ghee (clarified butter)," the officer replies.

"Even bottled drinking water may be contaminated with coliform bacteria. Sometimes packaged water contains a significant amount of metal particles. Such products are qualified as unsafe and substandard," Bhujbal cautions.

Role of FDA in curbing adulteration

FDA is a government agency responsible to enforce the Food, Drug, and Cosmetics Act fairly, uphold safety standards and protect consumers.

"There are 12 food safety officers (FSO) in Pune. They conduct regular

area-wise inspections of food manufacturing and packaged/bottled water units, shops, bakeries, hotels, and other places. During every inspection, 10 samples of food suspected to be adulterated are collected. The samples are then sent to the State Public Health Laboratory for testing," says Bhujbal.

The food can be safe or unsafe for human consumption. It can be substandard, if adulterated or misbranded if the contents of the packaged food differ from what is stated on the labels.

Once the State Public Health Laboratory certifies a particular sample to be unsafe for consumption, substandard or misbranded, a case is filed against the manufacturer, distributor, or seller and sent to the adjudicating officer who gives his judgment.

"The penalty for manufacturing or selling unsafe, substandard or misbranded food

50,000 and Rs 2 lakh and/or imprisonment for a period of not less than three months and not more than six months," Bhujbal explains.

Fortification of food items

On a number of occasions, food items are modified to improve their nutritional value. This is called 'fortification'.

According to Bhujbal, rice and oil fortification is done when certain essential nutrients are insufficient and they are added to balance the requisite quantity.

Strict adherence to norms

Elaborating further on the duties of the citizens, sellers and manufacturers of food items, FDA assistant commissioner Surender Shivsagar says, "It is mandatory for every shop and store to display its license and registration number.

He added, "Citizens should check for the Bureau of Indian Standards Certification label and FDA license, ISI mark. Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) certificate, and Best Before Date (BBD) while purchasing canned or packaged food, beverages and water. Besides, the consumers must also insist on being given valid bills bearing the name and address of the shop, license number of the seller, description of the items purchased and date of purchase.

'If any rules are being flouted, the FSO instructs the store to take corrective steps. If corrective measures are not adopted, the license is suspended and an adjudication process is initiated," he explains.

He adds, "Such adjudication process could result in two consequences. Firstly, the adjudicating officer, the ioint commissioner of FDA in case of Pune, may impose a fine. However, if the adjudicating officer finds the case to be of a grave and serious nature, he may authorise the FSO to file a criminal case, which will be tried in the court and sentence of imprisonment may be awarded by the judge.

Free ride for pupils

PMPML to provide travel passes to PMC school students at zero cost

n a welcome move, the Pune Mahanagar Parivahan Mahamandal Limited (PMPML) has decided to provide free bus passes to students of Class V to XII of Pune Municipal Corporation-run schools while private school students of Class V to X will have to pay only 25 per cent of the bus fare.

The scheme is aimed at encouraging students to use public transport. It would also help reduce volume of private vehicles on city roads and decongest roads in the vicinities of the schools.

Although the PMPML runs students' special services on many of its routes, majority of students still travel to and fro school using private vehicles, shared rickshaws or privately-operated vans and school buses. These private vehicles are parked on roads at the time of opening and closing of schools, which results in traffic congestion and snarls, especially in downtown parts of the city.

A press communiqué said the bus passes for the students of PMC-run schools will be financed 100 per cent from the special grant, while a portion of grant will be earmarked to finance 75 per cent of the amount of passes for private school students.

The students willing to travel by PMPML buses after obtaining passes will have to file applications with the PMPML to avail the discount. The forms would be made available at all PMPML bus depots and PMPML pass centres from Monday.

The filled up forms will be accepted at all PMPML depots. Schools would be allowed to collect the blank forms for students of the school concerned and submit the filled up ones at the PMPML bus depots in bulk. This decision is taken to ensure that students do not have to travel long distances and reach the bus depots or pass centres to complete the formality.

Private school students will be provided challans for the amounts to be paid to cover their bus fare after their forms are scrutinised and the documents enclosed as verified. Thereafter, the money will have to be paid at any branch of Bank of Maharashtra within the jurisdiction of the PMC. Thereafter, the students will have to submit their forms along with documents and the counter copy of the challan at the PMPML bus depot or PMPML pass centre.

Nitin Ramchandra Ghogre, manager of the pass department, PMC, said. "This initiative is started before the schools reopen this year which will enable students to avail the facility."

In April, some members of the society filed a complaint with the office of the deputy registrar of cooperatives accusing the society's executive body of violating the rules of the management committee and of being involved in financial irregularities.

Santosh Maskar, chairman of Roseland Society, said, "Ours is a



renowned housing society in the limits of the Pimpri Chinchwad Municipal Corporation (PCMC). The society has received several awards from the Central as well as

the state government."

He said, "The society has been discharging its functions in accordance with the law, rules, and byelaws. There had been no irregu-

embers of the third gender who have been so far deprived of toilets may heave a sigh of relief. The Pune Municipal Corporation (PMC) is planning to provide such facilities for them at 37 places in the city, thanks to the Flying Women Foundation, an NGO, for demanding the same.

A total of eight toilets will be constructed in the Nagar road-Wadgaon Sheri area, six under the Kondhwa-Yewalewadi ward office and four each under the Dhankawadi-Sahakar Nagar, Dhole-Patil Road and Wanawadi-Ramtekdi ward offices.

A 'pink campaign' was launched for women as there were very few toilets for them, but few thought about the third gender. Recently, the civic health department made a decision to help the community, which unfortunately faces a virtual ban on entering the public washrooms.

Ketaki Ghatge, assistant health officer, solid waste management department, said, "Toilets will be made exclusively for the third gender at government offices, public places and in private buildings. Areas have been earmarked and even work has started at a few

Chayavati Desale, president of Flying Women Foundation, said, "In the prevailing system of public sanitation, men and women are given priority. Where will the third parties

go? If they choose to use the men's restrooms. their safety may be at risk. The possibility of molestation or abuse cannot be ruled out.

"If they decide to use the women's restroom, they may face opposition. The question arises as to where they will go. Hence, a demand was made to Pune and Pimpri-Chinchwad civic bodies to build separate toilets for this community.'

My nails have become dry and brittle after doing regular gel polish and extensions. Is there any treatment for the same?

Wrist Arthroscopy: A reliable tool for treatment of wrist injuries

Wrist injuries are common and can range from mild sprains, which often resolve on their own,

to severe ligament iniuries and fractures that may require surgical intervention. **Sprains commonly** occur in activities such as tennis, weightlifting, and yoga, which put significant strain on the wrist. On the other hand, more serious injuries such as complete ligament tears, dislocations, and fractures are usually the result of falls on outstretched hands.

Mild sprains typically respond well to pain medication, wrist splints. braces, taping, and physiotherapy, facilitating effective recovery. However, in cases of more severe injuries such as complete tears

of the triangular fibrocartilage complex (TFCC) wrist ligament or fractures around the wrist, surgical intervention may be necessary.

Wrist arthroscopy, which is considered one of the best alternatives to open surgery, is increasingly being recommended by certain medical centres. This minimally invasive keyhole surgery involves making a small incision of less than half an inch and inserting a pencil-sized arthroscope (2mm) equipped with a built-in camera and light system. This enables the surgeon to project a clear view of the entire wrist joint on a screen, allowing for precise treatment.

Arthroscopic surgery is a valuable diagnostic and treatment tool, as it offers several advantages over open surgery, including

faster recovery.



fewer complications, and reduced postoperative pain. After the surgery, it is important to keep the wrist elevated. take prescribed medication, and wear splints for a few days. Early initiation of physiotherapy is crucial to regain strength and facilitate a quicker functional recovery of the hand and wrist.

It should be noted that wrist arthroscopy requires a steep

learning curve and expertise. Therefore, it is recommended that the procedure be performed by hand surgeons with sufficient experience and expertise in this field.



Who was the recipient of the first ever Nobel Prize in Literature?

The honour of being the first Nobel Prize winner in Literature The honour of being the first Nobel Prize winner in Literature went to Sully Prudhomme. Sully Prudhomme, whose real name was René François Armand Prudhomme (1839-1907), was the French poet and Nobel laureate, of the Parnassian school. He was born in Paris and trained in engineering, law, and philosophy. His early poems, such as Stances et poèmes (1865), les destins (1872; The Destinies), and Les vaines tendresses (1875; The Empty Endearments), are lyrical and sad. Later work was Parnassian in its antiromantic striving for aesthetic, objective expression of philosophical truth "it sieties". work was Parnassian in its antiromantic striving for aesthe objective expression of philosophical truth. "La justice" (1878) and "Le bonheur" (1888; Happiness) are considered masterpieces of analytic subtlety. He was admitted to the French Academy in 1881 and received the first Nobel Prize in literature in 1901.

Sully Prudhomme studied science at school but was forced Sully Prudhomme studied science at school but was forced by an eye illness to renounce a scientific career. His first job was as a clerk in a factory office, which he left in 1860 to study law. In 1865 he began to publish fluent and melancholic verse inspired by an unhappy love affair. Stances et poemes (1865) contains his best known poem, Le vase brisé ("The Broken Vase"). Les Épreuves (1866; "Trials"), and Les Solitudes (1869; "Solitude") are also written in this first, sentimental style. Sully Prudhomme later renounced personal lyricism for more objective approach of the Parnassians, writing poems

the more objective approach of the Parnassians, writing poems attempting to represent philosophical concepts in verse. Two of the best known works in this vein are La Justice (1878; "Justice") and Le Bonheur (1888; "Happiness"), the latter an exploration of the Faustian search for love and knowledge. Sully Prudhomme's later work is sometimes obscure and shows a naive approach to the problem of expressing philosophical themes in verse. He was elected to the French Academy in 1881.
